Trbn. start. at the stage entrance (om oh oh a ohum) repeat Trp. cross the stage from left to right. 2 Second time from right to left. walking toward the center Hn. Trbn. continue. Hn. Trbn. stop, come downstairs. 3 Strings: mode A. with the cymbals in hands Conductor dances in circle \angle without playing. 4 Steps in circle playing: $(x \times x)$ WW. join. Str. continue mode A. stop at the center 5 and Whom Trp. enter, walk around playing. WW. stop gradually. (watch Trp.) Str. continue. 6 Trp. exit. Str. change to mode B. (wait and listen to Str,) Enter Perc. 7 [om om om om omh] repeat Conductor ' with Perc.

Hn. Trbn. Start playing behind the audience, walk through the stage and off to the back stage. Str. continue playing, walk up the stage and walk around. WW. start playing, walk up the stage and walk around.

Kithara Kagura Materials 1 (to be memorized)

any order, repeat ad lib. Trp. (on stage) t+t... element 1 soft tonguing, one breath as long as possible while walking straight elem.2 move the bell up-, down-, left- or rightward elem.3 Woodwinds (Picc., Fl., Ob., Cl., Bsn.) (in the audience) no tonguing repeat ad lib. (*)
high tessitura, with slight variations every time

tenuto, no tonguing repeat ad lib. (*)

no accent, without regular pulse
ach phrase, count 3 slowly and sileral

(*) after each phrase, count 3 slowly and silently before playing again.

alternate

Kithara Kagura materials 2 (to be memorized)

Strings (in the audience) (loosen the hair of the bow)

pizz. or very short arco. mode A:

select one pitch, preferably distinct from others,

play loud and count 5 slowly and silently

before playing it again.

arco one full bow or tremolo of the same duration. mode B:

otherwise the same as in mode A.

Conductor (on stage) with Tibetan Cymbals (Bug-chel)

mute hit and fan

1 Percussionist with Tambourine (preferably Daf or Doira)

hit with wooden stick

hit o o o repeat x (rebound) repeat ad lib.

each stroke immediately after the conductor's cymbal stroke
